We are delighted to offer a three-week summer school in Public Health for students during July and August 2024.

The purpose of this summer course is to provide self-motivated international students who are interested in public health with an in-depth introduction to the subject, in a world class learning environment that is enriched with British culture. The University of Manchester has a high international standing and has been the home of 25 Nobel Prize winners.

During the 3-week summer school, students will be taught in small groups by experts in the fields of evidence synthesis, biostatistics, health economics and health inequalities, and will be supported to work together on group tasks to develop their epidemiology skills. Moreover, students will have the opportunity to practice their presentation skills in an academic setting to their peers and Manchester academics as well as having the opportunity to undertake situational learning where they can work with some of our academics and research staff on projects currently being undertaken.

These will include a welcome reception and a farewell celebration (involving Manchester academics and students), and trips to local attractions. We are confident that the summer school programme will give every participant a fantastic experience that will have lasting impact for the rest of their studies and career. EMERGENCY CONTACTS

HEALTH AND SAFETY

If you require urgent medical assistance, or a crime is currently happening, you must call 999.

If the incident occurs on campus, call the University of Manchester's security team (number on the back of your student card) on 0161 306 9966 as well. The security staff will be quicker to attend to the person in danger, has received first-aid training and will be needed to arrange for the ambulance to get to the right place. Similarly, if the incident occurs in your accommodation, please inform reception so that they can help.

If you have an urgent medical concern, but do not need medical assistance, you must use 111.

If you have been a victim of a non-emergency crime that has already happened, you need to report it by calling 101. Examples of such non-emergency crimes include stolen laptops, smartphones and mobile phones, minor traffic collisions, property damage or drug dealing.

If you are feeling ill and can wait for an appointment with the GP, please do so. This will require for you to have registered with a GP prior to taking the appointment, which is why we recommend you do this as soon as possible.


